The 2024 Watsonville-Santa Cruz JACL Local Scholarships

Applications are available on our website https://watsonvillesantacruzjacl.com and by contacting Marcia Hashimoto at hashi79@sbcglobal.net or (831) 722-6859 (please leave a message with your telephone number). **The filing deadline is Saturday, June 8th, 2024**.

Applicants will apply for scholarships by submitting generic application information that could apply to and satisfy all of the scholarship funds.

The W-SC JACL's Scholarship Committee will determine, based on factors such as meritorious performance; grades; participation in certain social activities and organizations, such as Kokoro no Gakko; level of volunteerism; and length of membership in the JACL, the Watsonville Buddhist Temple, and/or the Westview Presbyterian Church, which applicants receive which scholarships.

All scholarship recipients and their parents must be W-SC JACL, Watsonville Buddhist Temple, and/or Westview Presbyterian Church members for a minimum of one year prior to receipt of scholarship.

An announcement for scholarship applications will be included in the Watsonville-Santa Cruz JACL newsletter, the Watsonville Buddhist Temple's Ichimi, and the Westview Presbyterian Church's Chimes.

Kee Kitayama Memorial Scholarship: The Kee Kitayama Memorial Scholarship Fund was established by Watsonville-Santa Cruz JACL and Mrs. Keiko Kitayama in memory of her husband, Kee, who was our Watsonville-Santa Cruz JACL chapter president in 1987. Mr. Kitayama worked tirelessly for Redress and Reparations with the Civil Liberties Act of August 10, 1988. The Kee Kitayama Memorial Scholarship Fund provides much needed financial and moral support for our young scholars. It upholds Mr. Kee Kitayama's legacy, encouraging our youth in their pursuit of higher education. The Kee Kitayama Memorial Scholarship may be awarded to graduating high school seniors to be used towards their college education.

Frank Mito Scholarship: The Frank Mito Scholarship Fund was established by his family to provide financial support for local students pursuing higher education goals. Frank Mito was an active supporter of the Watsonville Japanese American community, and his scholarship fund was formerly awarded through Kokoro no Gakko ("School of the Heart"). The \$500 Frank Mito Scholarship may be awarded to a graduating high school senior, usually with Kokoro no Gakko participation, and may be additive to other JACL scholarships.

The Rekiso "Ray" and Hisako "Louise" Sako Scholarships: The Rekiso and Hisako Sako Scholarships were established in 2012 to help local students who are actively involved with the JACL, Watsonville Buddhist Temple, and/or Westview Presbyterian Church in pursuing their higher education goals. Mrs. Sako and the late Mr. Sako have been long time members of the JACL and Senior Center, and leaders among the Japanese American community. A four-year undergraduate scholarship may be awarded at a maximum of \$1,000 per year, and may be extended for a maximum of two additional years of graduate studies. This scholarship may be applied for at any time, from graduating from high school through completion of a masters degree (maximum of \$6,000 total).

JACL National 2024 Scholarship Program

The 2024 National JACL Scholarship Program has moved to online applications. An informational brochure, instructions, and applications are now posted on the National JACL website (www.jacl.org). Click "Youth" on the menu bar to access the scholarship program webpage. The scholarship categories offered are Freshman, Undergraduate, Graduate, Law, Creative Arts, Performing Arts, and Student Financial Aid.

FRESHMAN -- All freshman applications must be submitted directly by the applicant to National JACL through the online form no later than Friday, March 1, 2024 at 11:59 p.m. Hawaiian Standard Time (HST).

OTHER GRADE LEVELS -- The Undergraduate, Graduate, Law, Creative Arts, Performing Arts and Student Financial Aid applications must be submitted through the online form no later than Monday, April 1, 2024, 11:59 p.m. Hawaiian Standard Time (HST).

To All Applicants: All applications must be on the 2024 application form that is posted on the JACL website (www.jacl.org). Because the applications are online, you must complete them in one sitting; they will NOT save if you exit or reload the window. Note: the required Personal Statement essay prompt changes each year, so students must use the 2024 application for consideration by the National Scholarship Committees.

One must hold an individual or youth membership in the JACL. A family membership under one's parent(s) is NOT accepted.

All applications must be complete at the time of submission and meet the stated deadlines in order to be considered. Applications and required materials must be submitted through the form unless other methods for submission are stated on the form (i.e., transcripts, letter of recommendation). Incomplete applications will NOT be accepted or considered by the committees.

Students are allowed to apply to ONE CATEGORY ONLY: Freshman, Undergraduate, Graduate, Law, Creative Arts or Performing Arts. The exception to this rule is that ANY applicant may also apply for the Student Financial Aid Scholarship in addition to another category. However, a successful applicant will only receive the higher of the two awards applied for.

Applicants are judged on the basis of their JACL involvement, scholastic achievement, extra-curricular activities, community involvement, personal statement and letter of recommendation.

Requirements:

- JACL Membership (Individual or Youth/Student)
- Personal Statement
- A Letter of Recommendation
- Official transcripts (only one copy required from each school)

In August 2024, the scholarship recipients will have been determined and an electronic notification will be made to all applicants. The JACL chapters to which the awardees belong will be notified as well. In the Fall of 2024, the JACL national newspaper, the Pacific Citizen, will publish its annual Scholarship Edition highlighting all of the award recipients.

One must be enrolled in school in the Fall of 2024 in order to receive a scholarship.

Past recipients are limited to a total of two National JACL Scholarships.

Professional artists are NOT eligible to apply for either of the two art scholarships offered.

MEDICAL THOUGHT By Gindy Mine, RN

I could share information on COVID, RSV, the flu, dehydration, diabetes or high blood pressure or even more subjects. Either I have shared some information on some of these subjects in the past or there is a lot of information already out there.

What's been on my mind lately is a common product that I thought was pretty non-toxic that I help my patients with at times. I was using it to clean my bathroom sink and started thinking, if this can clean my sink, how toxic is it for humans? Advertisement says, it can:

- clean toilets, flower vases, bathtub, shower head, hairbrush, gardening tools, rust on mason jars
- clean stains in your cup from coffee/tea
- descale deposits in your tea kettle or coffee maker
- brighten up dingy fabric

And much more.

It can also contain much of the same ingredients as simple household cleaners and laundry detergents. It can also have a mild bleaching agent in it.

It can also contain an active ingredient persulfate, which is a known allergen. Problems from this ingredient can be a rash, tender gums, damage to your soft tissue, trouble breathing, asthma, dizziness, contact dermatitis, or low blood pressure. Persulfate is also in hair coloring products. Persulfate poisoning is rare but if you happen to drink it, you can end up in the emergency room. Yet many people soak (marinate) their dentures or mouth guards in it for 8 hours or more. This product is denture tablets.

Usually people put water in a cup/container, toss a denture tablet in it, then put their denture/partial in the container. In the morning, you grab your denture, sort of rinse it and put it back in your mouth. Some people get a rash just reaching in the container with the solution to retrieve their denture.

The newest technique is to have denture implants, so many of you do not have to worry about this issue. You might want to share this information with your grandparents or someone who might be in this arena.

This is just an FYI, it surprised me!

Day of Remembrance By Marcia Hashimoto

The Day of Remembrance (DOR) is a significant reminder of the fragility of civil liberties in times of crisis and the importance of remaining vigilant in protecting the civil and human rights and freedoms of all people.

The National and local chapters of the Japanese American Citizens League (JACL) annually observe the date of February 19, (1942), as the Day of Remembrance. On this day, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066 that authorized the forced eviction of 120,000 innocent Japanese, Japanese Americans from their homes in California, Oregon and Washington State designated as the Military Zone during WW II.

Without charges, an attorney, a trial or due process of law, our Nation's leaders failed to uphold our Constitutional Rights. Historical studies and facts confirmed that not one act of sabotage or espionage was ever reported or committed by the Japanese, Japanese Americans during WW II. A Congressional investigation committee concluded that racism, war hysteria and the failure of political leadership led to the travesty of the incarceration. 2/3 of the Nikkei imprisoned in remote camps were U.S. Citizens.

On February 19, 1942, Constitutional Rights with its professed "due process of law" were denied to its loyal citizens. That day in America's history is "The Day of Remembrance". It is observed annually throughout our Nation with the commitment that such an injustice will not be repeated.

Donations to our Day of Remembrance Education Fund (DOREF) are greatly appreciated. Donations provide educational resources and programs about our Japanese, Japanese American History to teachers, students and community members. Donations honor our JACL youth with scholarships, supports our informative newsletter "The Bridge", and helps maintain a safe and comfortable social and cultural meeting hall for our JACL Senior Center Members, Watsonville Taiko Members, Bonsai Club and Kokoro no Gakko staff.

Nihonmachi Outreach Committee Presents San Jose's 44th Annual Day of Remembrance

The event commemorates the signing of Executive Order 9066 which led to the World War II incarceration of over 125,000 people of Japanese descent, two-thirds of whom were American citizens.

The theme of the program is "Youth Activism: Building Community," bringing awareness to the public about the role young Japanese Americans played during the redress/reparations movement, and encouraging youth to become active in their communities

A survivor of WWII incarceration will remember his experiences in camp and how he was affected by incarceration in the difficult years of resettling after his release.

The program will feature the traditional candlelight procession through historic San Jose Japantown, speakers from the community, and a special performance by San Jose Taiko.





Hoonko By Rev. Hosei Shinseki





Shinran Shonin passed away on January 16 in 1263 C.E. at the age of 90 years old. It was 761 years ago. Kakunyo Shonin, the great-grandson of Shinran Shonin started *Hoonko* when he observed Shinran's 33rd memorial service. *Hoon* means a gathering to repay Shinran for his teachings. One of the ways in which we do this is to listen to the teachings that assure that each and every one of us are assured of birth in the Pure Land. *Hoonko* is the gathering to express our gratitude to Shinran.

Shinran was an amazing person in so many ways. His constant self reflection and honest assessment of himself are displayed in the above quote. Shinran called himself "Gutoku" a bald headed fool. Like all of us he suffered anxieties over the effects of his thoughts, words and actions. And for that reason, he desired realization of the Pure Land. Shinran also understood that realization the Pure Land is not of his own making, but we are pulled toward realization.

What does it mean to be pulled over to the Pure Land? As an example, there are people in our lives who are no longer with us, and yet beyond all barriers of space and time, the continue to influence and take effect upon our lives. It is beyond our control, beyond any manipulation. It is true and real, it is pure. As our thoughts turn towards our family members their world of truth continues to influence our lives, this is the Pure Land. Everything we have ever taken for granted, or never noticed is revealed to us. Our thoughts of self-centeredness, our ignorance, greed and anger are turned toward the Pure Land and we experience the embrace of the Buddha's Vow.

When our thoughts are turned toward the Pure Land, we become more conscious of this life and what we have received. We are, as Shinran says pulled over. Shinran realized his true and real self and honestly shared that with us. I believe he did this so that we can understand that despite our own anxieties and selfishness, we are embraced in Infinite Boundless life. When Infinite Boundless life embraces us, or takes effect upon us, it is Namoamidabutsu.

Over 700 years later we honor and thank Shinran with our *Hoonko* service, a gathering of gratitude and an opportunity to reflect on our own lives and the nembutsu in our lives.

Nirvana Day By Rev. Hosei Shinseki

There are many detailed explanations of what Nirvana means, but Nirvana Day just symbolizes the day that Shakyamuni Buddha died. We observe that day on February 15th. It is said that when one is born, one comes from the Truth, and when one dies they return to the Truth. This is true for all of us including the Buddha. So if we come from Truth, and shall return to Truth, what is most important?

Of course, the answer is this life is most important. The Buddha was asked, "What happens to us when we die?" "Is there another place, another world?" The Buddha did not answer but remained silent. He remained silent because the Buddha's teachings are for this life here and now. It is to resolve the anxieties and dis-ease that we experience in this life.

The Dharma, or Truths taught by the Buddha, are intended so that we may truly know and experience this life. That is why we recite Namoamidabutsu. *Namo* is you and I, *Amida Butsu* is all the causes and conditions for this life. When we put this together as Namoamidabutsu, it implies that I am one with Amida. What does that mean to be one with Amida?

Suppose if we were to ask the fish in the pond, "What is the true nature of water?" What would be their answer? How would he describe the water that surrounds him? A fish spends all its time in the water. He plays in it, he swims in it, his life depends on it. But do you think the fish is aware of water? The reason the fish is not aware of the water is because he does not know the true nature of water. The water and the fish are one. They are so intimately intertwined with one another; they are too close to each other for the fish to know the essence of water. We always neglect those things that we are closest to.

It is very much like our attitude to the air we breathe. It surrounds us and sustains us. We live our lives daily playing, working, and going about our business without being aware of the air we breathe.

So where is Amida Buddha? The truth is Amida Buddha is all those things, including people and events that make it possible for us to exist. It is all around us all the time. We are in fact one with Amida Buddha here and now, but we are too close to notice it. Once we know of it, our daily life becomes even more enhanced. That is the purpose of the Buddha's teachings.

During Nirvana Day it is a time for us to reflect and ask ourselves, "What events do you need to exist? What things do you need to exist? Who do you need to exist?" When you answer the questions, recite the Nembutsu, Namoamidabutsu.

The year started inauspiciously with the New Year's Eve flooding of the Temple facilities. Mud and water filled low lying areas of the buildings and grounds. We are grateful for the people who came out to clear the mud, fill and place sandbags around the Hondo, gym and apartment complex.

While we were able to clear the mud from the facilities quickly, it took nearly six months to completely clean up and make repairs from the floods including drying the ground underneath the buildings.

On the positive side, after three years of limited activities, we resumed our yearly events including Hanamatsuri, fireworks fundraiser, Obon, rummage sale and Mochi Tsuki. The events were well-attended and much appreciated after the limited opportunities to gather during the pandemic.

The Watsonville Buddhist Temple also hosted two other notable events this year: in August, the screening of *Sentimental Journey: A Nisei's Life* and in September, we had an Open House for members and supporters of the Temple.

Sentimental Journey was multimedia show, chronicling the pre-war, wartime, and post-World War II lives of Japanese and Japanese Americans, featuring images and over 20 of the Nisei's favorite Japanese and American songs. It brought back fond memories for attendees and was created as a way to say "Thank you" for paving the way for the younger generations to follow.


